



Seises

Seises, is a very simple game whose result depends exclusively on the luck that a player has in the deal.

- **Object of the game**

The main objective of the game is to be the first player to get rid of all the cards in his hands.

- **The pack**

Seises can be played with a Spanish deck of 40 or 48 cards.

- **Number of players**

As all the pack is dealt, all the players must receive the same number of cards. The number of players that can take part in *Seises* can be very variable. However, it is not advisable a number of player lower than four or higher than eight.

- **Rank and value of cards**

For this game, cards have no actual rank and value. Their correlative order is only taken into account, ascendant and descendent, in order to make the sequences in each suit.

- **The deal**

In the first hand, anyone can be the dealer, as the *leader* will be the player who holds the six of coins. The first leader will distribute the cards in the next hand. For the rest of the hands, the turn for dealing passes anticlockwise.

- **The play**

The pack is dealt between all the players. Players should discard one card by turn. Each sequence starts always from the six of each suit, growing upward towards the king in one direction and the ace in the other.

The player holding the six of coins starts the game, placing the card face up on the table. The turn goes on anticlockwise. If possible, each player has to put one six of the other suits or the next higher or lower card of a sequence that is already on the table. When different cards may be discarded, the player can choose any of them.

When there is not any chance to discard, the player who has the turn must announce it by saying "pass" and put the agreed amount in the pot placed in the centre of the table. *Then*, the turn passes to the next player to his right.

The first player to discard all the cards in his hand will be the winner and will take the pot.

For the next hand, the leader is the player placed to the first leader's left, discarding one six of any suit. If this player cannot discard one six, he must put the agreed amount in the pot, passing the turn to the next player.

Sometimes, it is played that the winner takes the pot and as well as an additional point for each cards that the remaining players still hold in their hands. In this case, the players agree a lower amount.
